



community— "to live and breathe community", mathematics, and performer (gospel genre).



Some have made notable accomplishments in the area of law, business, agriculture and environmental science.


## SFHA SENIOR SPOTLIGHT MR. ODELL CAMERON

Mr. Odell donated his field of peas for the SFHA Gardening and Gleaning Project that taught teenagers about the Sandhills African American tradition of giving to those in need.

Gleaning is a traditional Biblical practice of gathering crops by hand that have been left in the fields by the growers. Most of the food is gathered and given to those in need. Gleaning is an African American family tradition that has been handed down through generations and continues to be widely practiced today in the Sandhills of North Carolina.

The SFHA Gardening and Gleaning Project focused on African American cultural heritage preservation that reconnects our youth to their ancestral lands by encouraging new relationships with community seniors.

Local youth were partnered with senior adult gardeners to learn traditional land stewardship and gardening practices.
